III. Lake-Related Legislation

The LMAC voted on a position for each bill listed on the tracking spreadsheet, with the exception of those that were determined not to be relevant to lake management or had already been voted Inexpedient to Legislate by the legislature. A table summarizing the results is on the following page.

HB 150: Tracie Sales explained that the amended version of this bill was significantly less burdensome on LMAC members than the introduced version, but could still impose a fine on members who did not comply with the financial disclosure requirement.

HB 640: Amended version of the bill makes the proposed program voluntary.

HB 1124: Tracie reported that the RMAC was concerned about the removal of prime wetlands from new and existing state highways and their right-of-ways proposed in this bill.

HB 1245: The amended version of this bill is now specific to listed boards and commission, and removes some legislative members from some committees.

HB 1609: Captain Tim Dunleavy stated that the Department of Safety supports this bill as it would authorize Marine Patrol to regulate the placement of moored platforms and inflatables. These temporary structures are being installed in public waterbodies by people without water frontage, and Marine Patrol cannot regulate them. This bill is modeled after the Moorings law and would control the placement of these structures to prevent them from being placed directly in front of a neighbor's property, obstructing a view, or obstructing navigation. Tiffany suggested that the LMAC support this bill, as the Loon Preservation Committee has concerns placement of these structures and their effect on loon nesting habitat and other wildlife.

HCR 10: This bill, if passed, would result in a resolution sent to Congress.

- SB 428: This is a Rivers Program bill to eliminate the requirement for utility companies to notify Local Advisory Committees (LACs) on utility maintenance wetlands applications. The bill is not relevant to the LMAC. David Packard asked if LACs have approval or denial rights with regards to these applications. Tracie responded that they do, but they do not want it and NHDES is attempting to address this issue in rule.
- SB 476: Garret Graaskamp stated that from a public access standpoint, this bill would "level the playing field" by ensuring that municipalities cannot keep people from parking adjacent to a public boat access point if they are from out of town. He believes the NH Fish and Game Department is supporting this bill but is not certain. David Packard stated that Goffstown has

- done this at Glen Lake whereas since there are very few parking spaces adjacent to the boat ramp, the town has restricted those spaces to town residents only.
- SB 491: This bill would require additional Natural Woodland Buffer area to remain intact for parcels within the protected shoreland. The bill was amended but was then laid on the table.
- SB 496: David Packard noted that one of the LMAC's standing legislative positions is to support funding mechanisms such as this. Tracie stated that NHDES supports this bill but asks where the funding would come from. The RMAC supported this bill because removing PFAS from drinking water sources and wastewater discharges would also remove it from New Hampshire's rivers.
- SB 589: This bill would eliminate the frontage requirements and property line setbacks for docks at Spindle Point on Ossipee Lake. Tim Dunleavy stated that Marine Patrol is watching this one closely and had concerns about the state-wide implications of the bill as introduced. He stated that this small group of property owners on this point on Ossipee Lake are in agreement with one another. Tiffany Grade asked what the chance is that this would set a precedent. Tim stated that it could, but it is a bill the shoreland structures committee is discussing.
- SB 627: This is an NHDES driven bill to establish a dock registration procedure in order to properly document the location of grandfathered and unpermitted docks. Tim Dunleavy added that property owners would voluntarily register seasonal and permanent docks with NHDES. Lisa Morin asked what the RMAC's concerns with this bill are. Tracie replied that it could legalize non-compliant existing docks on rivers, which could be unsafe.
- SB 713: This bill would extend the existing Green Snow Pro program to municipalities, including the training, application of salt in the most efficient methods, use of the least amount of salt necessary, and the liability waiver. David Packard stated that the intent is to minimize the impact of salt to waterbodies. Rex Norman stated that municipalities support this bill. Lisa Morin asked how important it is for municipalities to have an insurance waiver. Tracie stated that she is not sure of the details and some of it may be written into the rules. She stated that for private entities, if they follow the rules, it is not that someone cannot bring forth a lawsuit, but it provides them a certain level of protection. She stated that if someone is grossly negligent that is another thing. David suggested supporting this bill.

IV. Surplus Land Review, Laconia

Jen Drociak provided an overview of 2020 SLR-003, Laconia. Tim Dunleavy stated that Long Bay is along the South Down Shores Development and that the railroad corridor is adjacent to the shoreline of Paugus Bay. He added that the development already has a significant dock system and multiple mooring fields, but this is a different group of individuals within that development that is requesting a separate set of moorings, and thus must own or lease lake-front property to be allowed the moorings. He stated that with a proposed mooring field of this size, DOS may make recommendations, but the Governor and Executive Council must approve 4+ moorings in a field.

Tim informed the LMAC that residents of the development oppose a proposed public walking trail along this railroad property. Garret Graaskamp confirmed this opposition by the residents to other public organizations desiring to use the railroad property for access to the lake, emphasizing that the residents want to use it for themselves for private access. He asked if the LMAC has any reason or obligation to take that into consideration if they decide to support this use of the railroad bed. David Packard stated that granting exclusive use may shut out the public for a passage way and recommended the LMAC support this SLR and include in the letter that others are not restricted in using the state property.

> Frank Lemay motioned that the LMAC support the SLR with the provision that the railroad bed is still maintained for access to the public. Seconded by Shane Bradt. The motion passed unanimously, via roll call.
